


Expenditures = \$300,547

What UDOT's Transportation Proposals Mean For Little Cottonwood Canyon Climbing

Save The Gate Boulders, Little Cottonwood Canyon, Utah

Under UDOTs plans for a gondola or additional lanes, over 100 iconic boulders will be impacted and the lanes of the canyon forever altered.

The Alpenbock Loop.

The nation's largest climbing access trail project, a one-mile hiking and climbing access trail that starts at the lower LCC Park & Ride and connects to the Grit Mill parking lot.

SLCA infrared trail counter data showed **30,000 trail uses** of the Alpenbock Loop in 2021.



Climbers Partner with LDS Church on Stewardship of Little Cottonwood Canyon Climbing

The Gate Buttress.

The Salt Lake Climbers Alliance leases 140-acres of Church property in lower LCC that allows for stewardship of the climbing resource and free access to the public.

SLCA infrared trail counter data shows **42,000 trail uses** at the Gate Buttress in 2021.





UDOT transportation proposals.

Two main transportation proposals to address winter traffic congestion in Little Cottonwood Canyon:

One would construct the world's longest gondola to carry riders to the top of the canyon.

The other would widen the canyon road by adding two bus-only shoulder lanes.

Either proposal would only service ski resorts at the top of the canyon and would not stop at any climbing areas, trailheads, or other dispersed recreation sites.



Our assessment.

UDOT's proposals would...

- Destroy or impact world-class climbing resources (no less than 40 boulders)
- Impact LCC's natural character
- Have cumulative impacts to the Wasatch Front watershed
- Serve only ski resort users on the busiest winter days (an estimated 25 days/year)
- Be fiscally irresponsible, at \$500 million in construction costs

The proposals have unacceptable impacts fail to solve the LCC transportation problem.

In 2021, the JEDI Committee...

- Made space for 15 free tickets to the climbing fest for those in financial need which included gear!
- Made accessible ticket options (donation/pay what you can) for our recent film event
- Reviewed our bylaws and policies to determine areas that could use more inclusivity
- Assisted with new framework for committee applications
- Took part in process of selecting a new policy committee member
- Assisted in sharing applications for SLCA positions with groups of underrepresented communities
- Created blog post on how UDOT proposals perpetuate marginalization in the Wasatch
- Reviewed climb fest survey with a JEDI lens
- Determined need for internal JEDI auditor and came up with request for proposal
- Led search for an independent audit company and choose one based on our unique needs

Fixed Anchor Maintenance.





Employed a professional anchor maintenance crew and field coordinator focused on workers safety and quality work

- Established work at height practices to ensure our technicians' safety
- Best practices for route establishment and maintenance
- Replaced almost 1,000 anchors see the full list <u>here</u>
- Inspected & maintained another 400+ anchors
- Documented all work and generated cost analysis for each project
- Acquired land manager approvals and continued policy advocacy for future work to address fixed anchor maintenance in Wilderness
- Shared our program with the community at large presented our program for an <u>Access Fund webinar</u> and worked with local climbing organizations across the nation to share best practices and work at height standards for anchor maintenance

Fixed Anchor Maintenance.





Whole-crag **anchor replacement projects** at the these popular sport climbing areas and replaced ~1,000 anchors:

- Minimum Crag, Zen Garden and Pipeline in Maple Canyon
- Dry Wall in Echo Canyon
- Bingo Baby Buttress in American Fork Canyon

Completed **anchor maintenance**, **hardware upgrades and selective replacement projects** at these popular areas on 400+ anchors:

- Gate Buttress and Hellgate Towers in Little Cottonwood
 Canyon
- Challenge Buttress, Narcolepsy Crag, Salt Lake Slips, Dogwood Crag & Ambush Wall in Big Cottonwood Canyon
- Ruth Lake, Stone Garden and Cliff Lake in the Uinta mountains
- Provided support for SLC SAR operations in Big and LIttle Cottonwood Canyons

Jacob's Ladder Trail Realignment to Lone Peak Cirque.




ABOUT: The trail's destination is the summit of Lone Peak (11,260 feet) and it gains 5,600 feet of elevation over six miles from the Peak View TrailHead. The worst part of this approach is this middle section, where 1.3 miles of a section known as (upper) Jacobs Ladder gains 2,200 feet, with an average grade of 32%+.

The new segment will switch back across the slope rather than climbing directly up it, allowing for frequent drainage opportunities and thus decreased erosion. The new trail will average a 16% grade rather than 32%+ grade. It will also include closure of the old trail once complete.

Jacob's Ladder Trail Realignment to Lone Peak Cirque.

Over 4,000 feet of trail, or almost a half mile, was rerouted on the upper Jacob's Ladder approach to Lone Peak Cirque in 2021 by our professional trail contractor, Single Track Trails, and with the support of the Salt Lake Ranger District.

Total time spent on the project between employees and volunteers was over 1,000 hours with 95 hours of support from our partners at the Access Fund Conservation Team and 75 hours of volunteerism.

Stay tuned for this work to resume in the spring of 2022 with Adopt a Crag opportunities as we continue the 2.5 miles remaining of this reroute.
